WHEREAS, a contractual agreement was entered into between GBHWC and Contractor on April 25, 2016 that includes in SECTION III CONTRACT TERM and option for GBHWC to enter into up to two (2) additional one (1) Fiscal Year periods, FY 2017 and FY 2018 each being a (Renewal Term);

WHEREAS, GBHWC and Contractor agree to enter into a Renewal Term for FY 2017;

NOW THEREFORE, GBHWC and Contractor, in consideration of mutual covenant hereinafter set forth, agree as follows:

The parties herein agree to a first amendment first year renewal of the contract term from October 01, 2016 to September 29, 2017 pursuant to the agreed compensation set forth in Attachment A attached in the not to exceed Fiscal Year amount of Seventy-Six Thousand Dollars (\$76,000.00) and any additional terms and conditions set forth in Attachment B attached.

Sections III, IV and V of the contract are here in amended to reflect the changes above.

All other terms and conditions remain the same between the parties.


Program Coordinator	The Program Coordinator will use 17.5 hours per week to manage and coordinate all PEACE PFS program activities including but not limited to coordination of activities and meetings for the Guam Amateur Baseball Association and its community members and prepare briefings and program updates for the PEACE administrative staff; responsible for serving as a liaison with program Trainers/Consultants and Contractors; maintaining all program files and documentation; developing all promotional materials related to key program activities; direct the drafting media advisories and coordinating outreach to the community; planning and coordinating all training events for Facilitators and/or community members and key stakeholders; receiving and processing all contract invoices for approval and payment; procuring all supplies and materials needed for program implementation; sourcing all vendors for printing and other services required by the program and maintaining all program reports, summary briefings, recommendations and evaluations.
Program Secretary	Using 2 hours per week, the program Secretary will types reports, correspondence, and other material involving considerable use of judgment as to form, arrangement, and spacing. Sets up and maintains standard office files and records; records meeting minutes; relieves supervisor of all clerical details on minor administrative matters. Performs related duties as required.
Accounting Clerk	The Accounting Clerk will spend 2 hours per week to maintain controlling ledgers; reviews and analyzes financial accounting transactions and documents for accuracy and propriety; prepares summaries, reports and financial statements; advises management concerning financial problem areas. Participates in the installation and modification of accounting systems to meet the needs of the mandated requirements. Conducts an internal audit of financial records.
Program Assistant	2 individuals (primary will use 10 hours per week and secondary will use 4 hours per week) designated to assist the Program Coordinator, professional and technical staff by providing information to community members concerning programs available. Assists community members in their use of available resources in such areas as underage drinking and problem adult binge drinking. Contacts youths and adults in the assigned community; establishes rapport and assists in identifying at-risk individuals for program recruitment, support and guidance. Attends community meetings to secure and impart information relating to Program sustainability. These individuals will also ensure the policy of the prohibited use of alcohol is adhere to at GABA events.
Game Official Umpire	2 individuals responsible for officiating each baseball event, to maintain standards of play and ensure that game rules are observed and maintained.
Game Official Scorer	Responsible for providing a record of each baseball activity, a required individual that is an official part of each game.
Gamechanger Program Advertising and Marketing	Contract agreement to complete the following tasks; work with advertising and marketing professionals to create an attractive campaign that the community will find appealing, relay information regarding public policy and perception, draft press release and maintain a dedicated website.

2) AIR TRAFFIC CONTROLLERS AND WEATHER OBSERVERS - NIGHT PAY & SUNDAY PAY: If you work at night as part of a regular tour of duty, you will earn a night differential and receive an additional 10% of basic pay for any hours worked between 6pm and 6am. If you are a full-time employed (40 hours a week) and Sunday is part of your regularly scheduled workweek, you are paid at your rate of basic pay plus a Sunday premium of 25% of your basic rate for each hour of Sunday work which is not overtime (i.e. occasional work on Sunday outside the normal tour of duty is considered overtime work).

All dry-house activities involving propellants or explosives. Demilitarization, modification, renovation, demolition, and maintenance operations on sensitive ordnance, explosives and incendiary materials. All operations involving regrading and cleaning of artillery ranges.

A 4 percent differential is applicable to employees employed in a position that represents a low degree of hazard when working with, or in close proximity to ordnance, (or employees possibly adjacent to) explosives and incendiary materials which involves potential injury such as laceration of hands, face, or arms of the employee engaged in the operation, irritation of the skin, minor burns and the like; minimal damage to immediate or adjacent work area or equipment being used. All operations involving, unloading, storage, and hauling of ordnance, explosive, and incendiary ordnance material other than small arms ammunition. These differentials are only applicable to work that has been specifically designated by the agency for ordnance, explosives, and incendiary material differential pay.

**** UNIFORM ALLOWANCE ****

- 3) The contracting officer reviews the proposed action and promptly submits a report of the action, together with the agency's recommendations and pertinent information including the position of the contractor and the employees, to the Wage and Hour Division, Employment Standards Administration, U.S. Department of Labor, for review. (See section 4.6(b)(2) of Regulations 29 CFR Part 4).
- 4) Within 30 days of receipt, the Wage and Hour Division approves, modifies, or disapproves the action via transmittal to the agency contracting officer, or notifies the contracting officer that additional time will be required to process the request.
- 5) The contracting officer transmits the Wage and Hour decision to the contractor.
- 6) The contractor informs the affected employees.

Information required by the Regulations must be submitted on SF 1444 or bond paper.

When preparing a conformance request, the "Service Contract Act Directory of Occupations" (the Directory) should be used to compare job definitions to insure that duties requested are not performed by a classification already listed in the wage determination. Remember, it is not the job title, but the required tasks that determine whether a class is included in an established wage determination. Conformances may not be used to artificially split, combine, or subdivide classifications listed in the wage determination.

I am recommending the **first amendment first renewal agreement** of the multi-term contractual agreement between the Guam Behavioral Health and Wellness Center (GBHWC) and Guam Amateur Baseball Association, signed by the Governor on April 25th, 2016.
